Holiday Virtual Graduation



Holiday Tips

The holidays are here, and we want to share some tips to make it safe and enjoyable for you and your dog.

- For working Dog Guides: if the dog is in harness, do not to distract them and only interact when given permission and if the dog is on a break from working.
- Have your dog in a crate when visitors are arriving. Once things have settled, bring your dog out to greet guests. If they are a Dog Guide, they should be wearing their gear (Halti, collar and leash).
- Such a busy environment might be too stressful for a dog. Remember to give them time to rest during visits if they are over stimulated.
- If other dogs are present, introduce them in a neutral setting.
- Be aware of things that can make your dog sick like poinsettias, grapes, chocolates, Christmas tree water, nuts, candy, chocolate, alcohol and baked goods.
- Do not leave any wrapped food gifts under the tree, on the floor or anywhere that is accessible to the dog .
- Clean up all wrapping, ribbons and bows from gifts so the dog does not ingest them.
- Watch the dog around certain decorations like lights, tinsel, ribbons, candy canes, garland. Make sure they do not eat them.

Accessible Travel Initiatives – Sunflower Lanyard

As the holiday season approaches it is often accompanied by increased travel. We would like to highlight an initiative that we have learned about through our partnership with Pearson Airport:, the Sunflower Lanyard.

This initiative was started at Heathrow Airport in 2016 to support people travelling with invisible disabilities, as a way for them to signal they may need more time or support to get on or off an airplane without having to ask for assistance. This program has now expanded to over 100 airports around the world. If you are looking to learn more about this program, or which airports use Sunflower Lanyards, you can visit Hidden Disability's website

If you are travelling through Toronto Pearson Airport you can request a lanyard a minimum 14 days in advance of travel, or by going to Lost and Found in Terminal 1 or Information Counters in Terminals 1 and 3. Male Poodles Wanted for Breeding

After Labrador retrievers and lab/golden crosses, the most common breed of Dog Guide at Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides is the Standard Poodle. Poodles have been a part of the breeding program at LFCDG for many years, and are used primarily for clients with dog allergies. We currently have 9 female and 4 male poodles in our breeding colony. With the goal of maintaining the high standards required for a working Dog Guide while increasing genetic diversity in our breeding population, we are currently looking to connect with poodle breeders who would consider donating stud services to our organization.

Suitable dogs would have the following:

- A 5 generation pedigree
- Health clearances for hips, elbows, eyes, and sebaceous adenitis at minimum
- Moderate energy level, willing to work but able to settle
- Don't display aggression, separation anxiety, or significant prey drive
- Confident in a variety of situations, no significant fears
- Breeder willing to allow a Dog Guides representative to visit and assess the stud dog
- Local to southern Ontario or have access to a veterinarian experienced in collecting and shipping semen
- Negative brucellosis test prior to breeding

Stud owners would have the option to receive a puppy back from a successful litter as a stud fee and receive updates on the puppies' progress in our Dog Guide training programs.
