National Puppy Day is March 23rd

On March 23rd, we are celebrating the journey of a future Dog Guide. Get ready to spoil your foster puppies with lots of love and praise for National Puppy Day. One day, they are going to grow up to change someone's life forever.

Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guide puppies are brought into the world with a bigger purpose in mind. Their journeys start right from birth to when they are placed with a Canadian applicant living with a disability. When they grow up, they are enrolled in Dog Guides University where they learn more specialized skills in one of our seven programs. Finally, after months of hard work they are matched with their new handler and will help them lead safe and independent lives.

A puppy's journey starts at the LFCDG puppy nursery in Breslau, ON, where they spend the first 7 weeks of their life with their mom and litter mates. Once they are old enough, they are then sent to live with a foster family in a loving home. For approximately a year, they work on basic training, obedience and socialization with their foster. Afterwards, they go on to Dog Guides University where they will complete formal training in one of our seven programs and go on to meet their new handler.

So many people are involved in the Dog Guide's journey and we are thankful to every one of them. Dog Guide Clients and Wayfinding Technology Survey

The Toronto University Health Network (UHN) Kite Research Institute is inviting Dog Guide Clients to participate in an online study on Wayfinding. Wayfinding refers to the information systems put in place to help someone get from Point A to Point B. There are a variety of tools and technologies available that guide people through physical environments, like interactive maps, symbols and even different design choices like the use of colours. The purpose of the survey is to find out your experiences with Wayfinding and the common tools that used.

In order to take part in the study, participants must meet the following criteria:

- At least 18 years old
- Live in Canada
- Identify as having lived experience with disability or health condition(s) that affects your experiences with wayfinding and/or use a support person (such as an intervener, interpreter, or sighted guide) for wayfinding.

The survey includes approximately 49 questions and the time needed to complete the survey will vary, but it is estimated that the survey will take between 15 minutes to 30 minutes to complete.

Participants can complete the survey online, using paper forms sent by mail, through a telephone interview, or through a video call. If you have any questions or would prefer to participate in the survey offline, please contact Alison Novak at <u>Alison.novak@uhn.ca</u> or 416-597-3422 ext. 7878.

Participants will be given a \$50 honorarium for completing the survey.
