Diabetes Alert Dog Bonnie Saves the Day

Camille received her Diabetes Alert Dog, Bonnie, in 2022. Since then, they have returned home together in Quebec, and have proven to be a remarkable team.

One day, Camille was home alone and her Dexcom was charging. A Dexcom is a device used by people with diabetes to monitor their glucose levels, and it can be very dangerous for them to go without it. Camille also has hypoglycemic unawareness, meaning she can't feel when her blood sugars drop, making it even more dangerous for her to go without a Dexcom device. Due to the Dexcom charging, Camille had to go without her device for 2 hours, meaning she was unaware of her glucose levels.

When Camille and Bonnie walked into her room, Bonnie began to alert Camille by nudging her nose against Camille's leg. However, Camille felt fine due to her hypoglycemic unawareness, and thought that



maybe Bonnie was trying to get some extra treats. Camille ignored Bonnie's alerts, but Bonnie continued to persistently nudge Camille against her leg, insisting she check her blood sugar levels. Bonnie had gotten so frustrated with Camille not listening to her, that Bonnie went and fetched Camille's blood testing kit, on her own without being asked, in order to force her to check her levels. As Bonnie approached Camille, she collapsed to the ground and became unresponsive. Bonnie, being the brilliant girl she is, began to bark for help to get someone's attention to help Camille. Camille's neighbour is aware that Bonnie is a Diabetes Alert Dog, and if she is barking then there is an emergency in the home. Bonnie barked for over 5 minutes, until the neighbour ran inside Camille's home and found her passed out on the floor. Her neighbour called 911, and when EMS arrived Bonnie refused to leave Camille's side and remained concerned for her well-being.

Camille is now okay thanks to Bonnie's persistence and quick thinking. Way to go Bonnie for keeping Camille safe!













Public Access Barriers Survey



Did You Know - Harmful Effects of Smoking on Dogs

We are all aware that smoking can have harmful effects on one's health, even secondhand smoke can be dangerous to others, but have you thought of how it can affect dogs? Smoking cigarettes, e-cigarettes and marijuana all pose a risk to our canine friends.

Secondhand smoke from cigarettes and vaping is just as harmful to dogs as it is to humans. Living with someone who smokes puts dogs at a greater risk of many health problems like eye infections, allergies, respiratory issues and cancer. Smoke from marijuana can also be irritating to dogs. Dogs who inhale a lot of smoke could develop signs of toxicity or marijuana poisoning. Signs could be lethargy, vomiting, tremors, dilated pupils and urinary incontinence. They breathe the same air that we do, so it is important that they live in a healthy environment.

Dogs may also be at risk of consuming discarded cigarette butts, e-cigarettes or marijuana. A cigarette contains over 7,000 chemicals, many of which are toxic. Accidently consuming marijuana can also be harmful to your dog and can lead to sickness too. However, ingesting liquid nicotine is the most dangerous because tobacco is so concentrated. If a dog accidentally ingests an e-cigarette cartridge containing this liquid, it can quickly absorb in the gastrointestinal tract and cause serious problems. It is important that you seek emergency veterinary care for your dog if this happens.

If consuming marijuana, it is best to do so outside away from your dog. As well, always properly discard cigarettes/ e-cigarettes and do not leave remnants lying around.

It is important that we take the necessary precautions to keep a safe, smoke free environment for future Dog Guides and working Dog Guides.















Thank You for Your Service

We are working on a new addition to the newsletters thanking Dog Guides that have passed away or have retired to recognize their years of service. Moving forward, we will recognize these Dog Guides on our newsletter in our August and December newsletters. This new idea was brought forth by Service Dog Guide graduate Tammy Walsh. Earlier this year she retired her Service Dog Guide, Kiwi. This idea means a lot to her:

"In a graduate's eyes, retirement is the end of a working team. Maybe because of health issues or sudden loss of life. Regardless of the reason, I believe that each and every dog should be mentioned and be celebrated as they all deserve to be thanked for their service!

Shortly after graduation, I realized that our dogs are all superheroes. Our dogs are similar but also unique in how they fit into our lives. The similarities to our dogs are that each and every one of them, in some way, change our lives, but they also save our lives!

For example, thanks to Autism Assistance dogs, families can now do tasks like going out to get groceries, go to sporting events, and family time can be spent as a family and for the first time in, however long, their child will sleep the whole night because of their dog! Diabetes Alert Dog Guides allow a person to safely go about their day, knowing that having their dog beside them to alert them that their sugar is dropping before they even know it, changes and saves a life.

For me in the Service dog program, I received Kiwi 30 years post injury, which left me unable to walk and needing to use a wheelchair for the rest of my life. I had no idea how bringing this dog into my life would change me forever. It's not just picking items I've dropped, opening a door, helping me make the bed, do the laundry, but she opened up my world, and I got to know the people in my neighborhood thanks to Kiwi. I was afraid that having a Service Dog Guide by my side would bring more attention to the disability, when in fact it did the total opposite.

Having Kiwi by my side brought people over to ask questions and have conversations with me that would never have taken place If I did not have her. She was the catalyst for those conversations. This incredible, intelligent, beautiful, standard poodle has saved my life, literally twice. First, when she scared off a coyote that I had no idea was following us, and the second time, Kiwi alerted me when we were out for our walk that someone was behind me attempting to get into my backpack that was on the back of my chair. Kiwi has also gone to get help when my wheelchair has gotten stuck. I could go on and on about what Kiwi has done for me but I'm afraid that would take far too long!











I hope that this will be a welcome addition to the newsletter so that everyone who receives it, whether they be a foster, grad, Lion, volunteer, or donor will see and hopefully understand that our dogs are not just dogs, they are "just the dogs that save and change lives" and that's why when they retire, they should be celebrated and recognized for their dedicated service!"

Canine Vision Program Update

We are excited to share that the Canine Vision program will be opening their waitlist from November 13 until November 27, 2023. During those dates, people that are blind or visually impaired and are interested in receiving a Canine Vision Dog Guide that is a Labrador Retriever or Golden Retriever, will be able to submit an Expression of Interest. If you're interested in applying, visit our website and read the <u>Discovery Package</u> for more information on the applicant journey.

Once you've reviewed the Discovery Package document, applicants will be able to submit an expression of interest.

Currently, we have 15 spaces available on our waitlist. If we receive more expressions of interest than available spots on the waitlist, we will select a limited number randomly and process those expressions of interest only. Those who are not selected will need to wait for the next time the waitlist reopens to reapply.

New Scholarship Program


Give the gift of education and help change lives!

Canine Vision Program Donation to honour mom

Jill Thompson wanted to do something to honour her 96-yearold mom, Marian Thompson. Jill's donation to the Canine Vision Dog Program was influenced by her mom's struggle with being blind in one eye and having low vision in her other eye, along with Jill's love of dogs.

Jill's mom grew up fearful of dogs all her life, but when Jill was 8 years old and told her mom she "couldn't live this life without a dog", Marian knew it was time to overcome her fear. As it turned out when they got their first dog, a golden retriever named Vixen, Marian was the one who ultimately took care of her and nursed her through a major sickness. She was the family pet for more than 11 years.



Jill's first-time donation to LFCDG of \$200,000 will help many for years to come. The donation includes purchasing a van for the program which will be used for training and team outings for future Canine Vision classes, and towards full scholarships for four Canine Vision teams.

Jill has also enrolled to become a foster! She has her mom on board as she spends lots of time with her and will want to bring the puppy along.

"I am always in awe when I see Dog Guides with their partners, and it amazes me the astounding impact these dogs have in so many people's lives."



One of the sponsored dogs will be a Canine Vision Dog Guide named Birksy, in honour of Jill's mom. There were three "Marians" in Jill's mom's nursing class, so they were given nicknames using their surnames, adding a "y" in this case.
