Hearing Dog Guide Expression of Interest Opening June 16


We're excited to announce that our <u>Hearing Dog Guide Program</u> Expression of Interest will open on June 16, with only 15 spots available. The Expression of Interest will close on June 30 or as soon as all spots are filled.

Hearing Dog Guides are specially trained to assist Canadians aged 16 and older who are deaf or hard of hearing. These dogs alert their handlers to important sounds like doorbells, alarms, ringing phones, and even fire alarms—enhancing safety, awareness, and independence at home.

If you or someone you know is considering applying, be sure to read our <u>Discovery Package</u> beforehand. It outlines the qualifications and key information to help you decide if this journey is right for you. Applicants must be prepared to care for and handle a Dog Guide independently and commit fully to the application process.

A Dog Guide isn't just a helper—it's a partner in everyday life.

Volunteer Opportunity: Breeding Dog Foster Family

Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides is currently seeking long-term foster homes for a few of our breeding dogs. These adult dogs (around 1-2 years old) have been raised in our foster puppy program and selected for their excellent health and temperament. While we work with Labrador Retrievers, Golden Retrievers, and Standard Poodles, we are specifically looking for families interested in fostering female Standard Poodles at this time.



What fostering a breeding dog involves:

- Providing day-to-day care, ensuring the dog stays healthy and at an ideal weight
- Notifying breeding staff when the dog comes into heat or if any concerns arise
- Traveling as needed to our facilities (mainly in Breslau, just outside of Guelph) for food pickup, vet visits, and breeding
- Delivering the dog to our puppy nursery approximately one week before her due date to deliver and raise her puppies

Benefits of fostering a breeding dog:

- Welcoming a healthy, well-tempered dog into your home
- Contributing directly to the training of Dog Guides for Canadians with disabilities
- Food, vet care, and dog sitting are all provided free of charge during the dog's time in the breeding program
- Ongoing support from our breeding program staff
- Upon retirement (after a maximum of 4-5 litters), you will have the option to adopt the dog at a reduced adoption fee
